We Are All Immigrants — March 2013 Congregation Gathering

he focus of our March 2013 Congregation Gathering was our chapter direction statement in which we called one another "to respond in new ways to the needs of people who are poor and marginalized, especially immigrants." Rosemary Brennan, CSJ, introduced the day and welcomed all – both those present in the Motherhouse Chapel and those participating via streaming video. In her opening remarks Rosemary commented,

"We are most grateful for your presence and interest in this important topic of immigration. At the time we voted on our chapter direction statement we could not have anticipated how this issue would gain such energy and come to the forefront of our national conversation.

Given the current energy and momentum on this important issue, we are well poised to delve deeper into the ramifications related to immigration hopefully in order to help shape, guide, and influence future immigration policies. Today's meeting gives us the opportunity to renew our commitment to the justice issues that surround the immigration debate.

We do this in order to make sure that the needs of newcomers, especially the poor and marginalized, will be heard and addressed in order to implement laws which respect the human dignity of each person."

Rosemary went on to say, "For years we have been blessed and even spoiled by having passionate and talented members of our congregation lead and direct our works of justice and peace. They educated us, challenged us to take direct action both locally and nationally, and always kept us on the cutting edge of major issues. Most recently it is to Carole Lombard, CSJ, that we owe this deep debt of gratitude." This gratitude for Carole's passion and dedication was demonstrated in the applause that followed.

Our opening and closing prayer framed the context for the video We Are All Immigrants, created by religious congregations in the Pittsburg, PA area followed by an insightful and informative presentation by Pat Andrews, CSJ. Pat began by explaining that Sisters of St. Joseph arrived in Boston in 1873 to serve an immigrant population. Now it is our turn to learn from new immigrants about the challenges that face them each day. Who are these immigrants? They are our neighbors. They are people we know. Combining a wealth of statistics and personal stories, Pat wove a message that left us wanting to know and do more.

As the gathering concluded, two goals were accomplished. First: to further educate ourselves on the topic of immigration through personal stories, Church teaching, and the awareness of the current political situation. Second: to seek a commitment from each sister and associate as to how we, personally, will be willing to engage in our chapter direction statement as we move forward. **

A Worldwide Movement of Christian Women

n March I, I gathered with a few women at the Friends Meeting House (Quakers) in Rochester, NH, for the World Day of Prayer. This year's meeting was especially meaningful for me as the prayer was prepared by the women of France and the theme was Welcoming the Stranger – Immigration. Participating in this worship service sponsored by the Greater Rochester Interfaith Council (GRIC) connected me with our foremothers in France, our sisters around the world and our Boston CSI stance on Immigration.

The World Day of Prayer is a worldwide movement of Christian women of many traditions. On the first Friday of March each year they come together in more than 170 countries and regions to observe a common day of prayer, fellowship, and understanding. In many countries, the groups have a continuing relationship in prayer and service.

Through World Day of Prayer, women affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence in the world. The motto of the World Day of Prayer is "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action."
